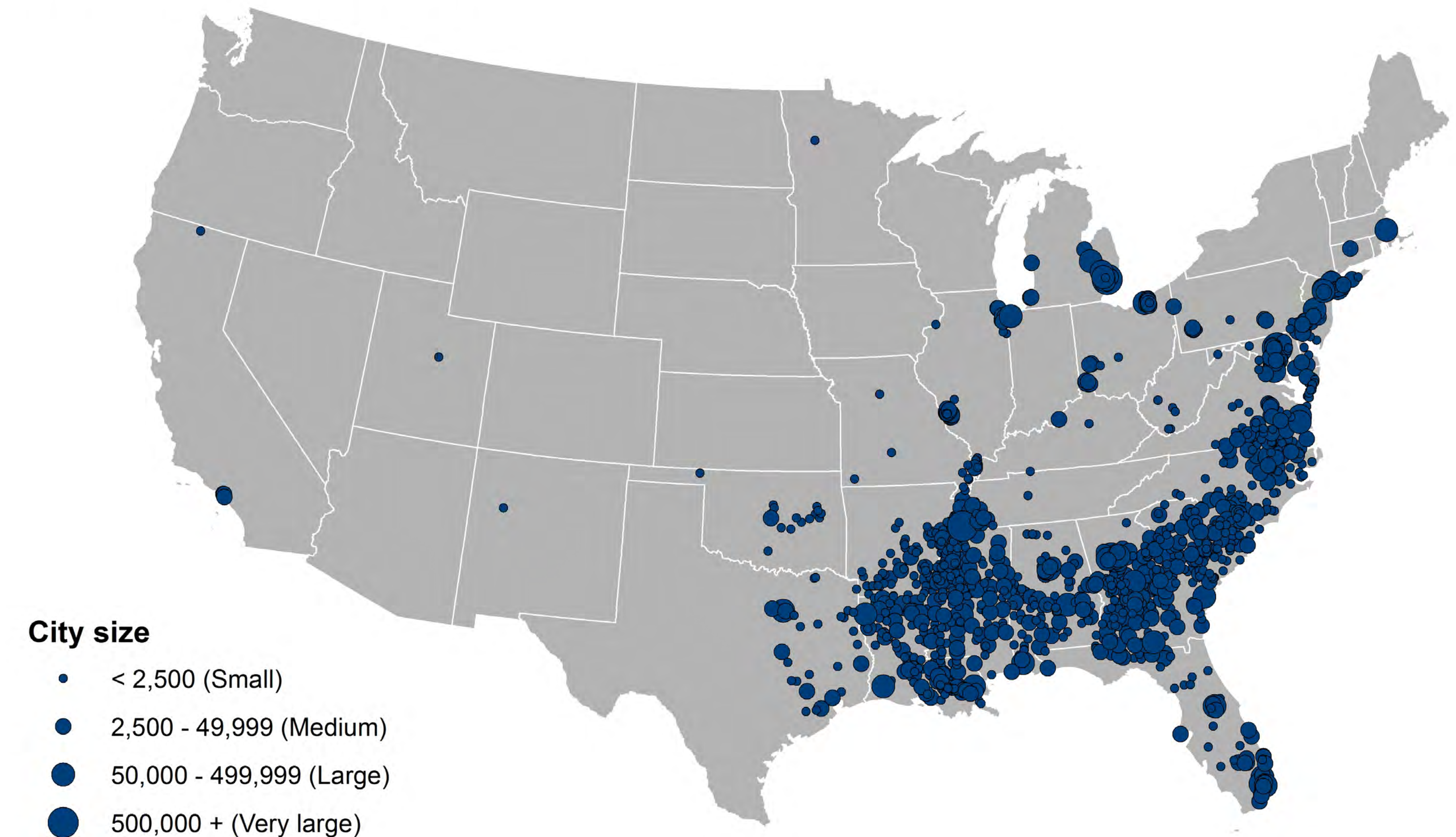

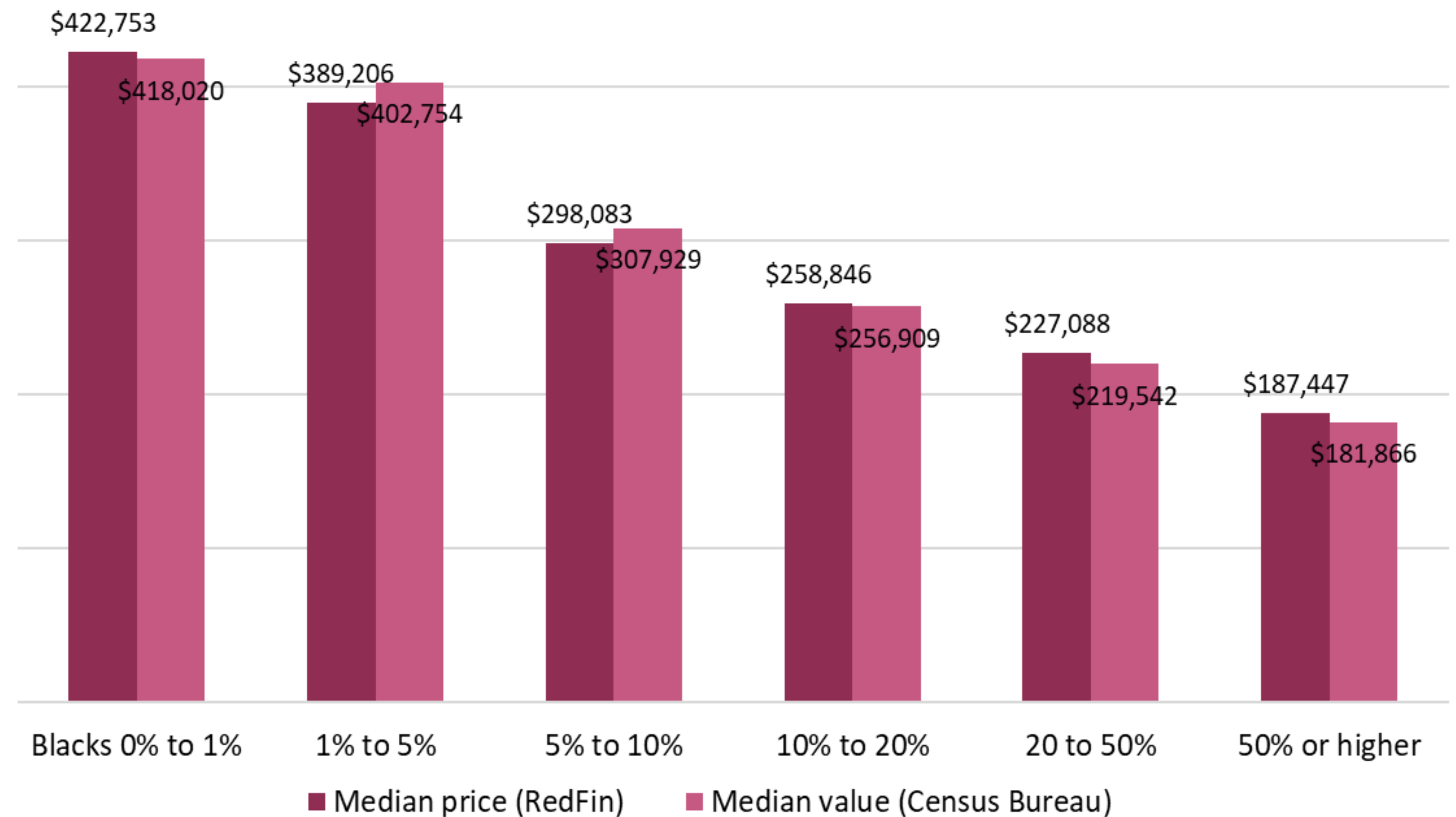
We must focus on the assets

- Research on the devaluation of housing, businesses and commercial property showed us that assets in Black neighborhoods are much more valuable than are priced and how structural racism extracts wealth and opportunity
- The Black Progress Index and our social determinants of health research showed us life expectancy is often much higher (or lower) in cities than is predicted.
- We want to learn from the places that are thriving.

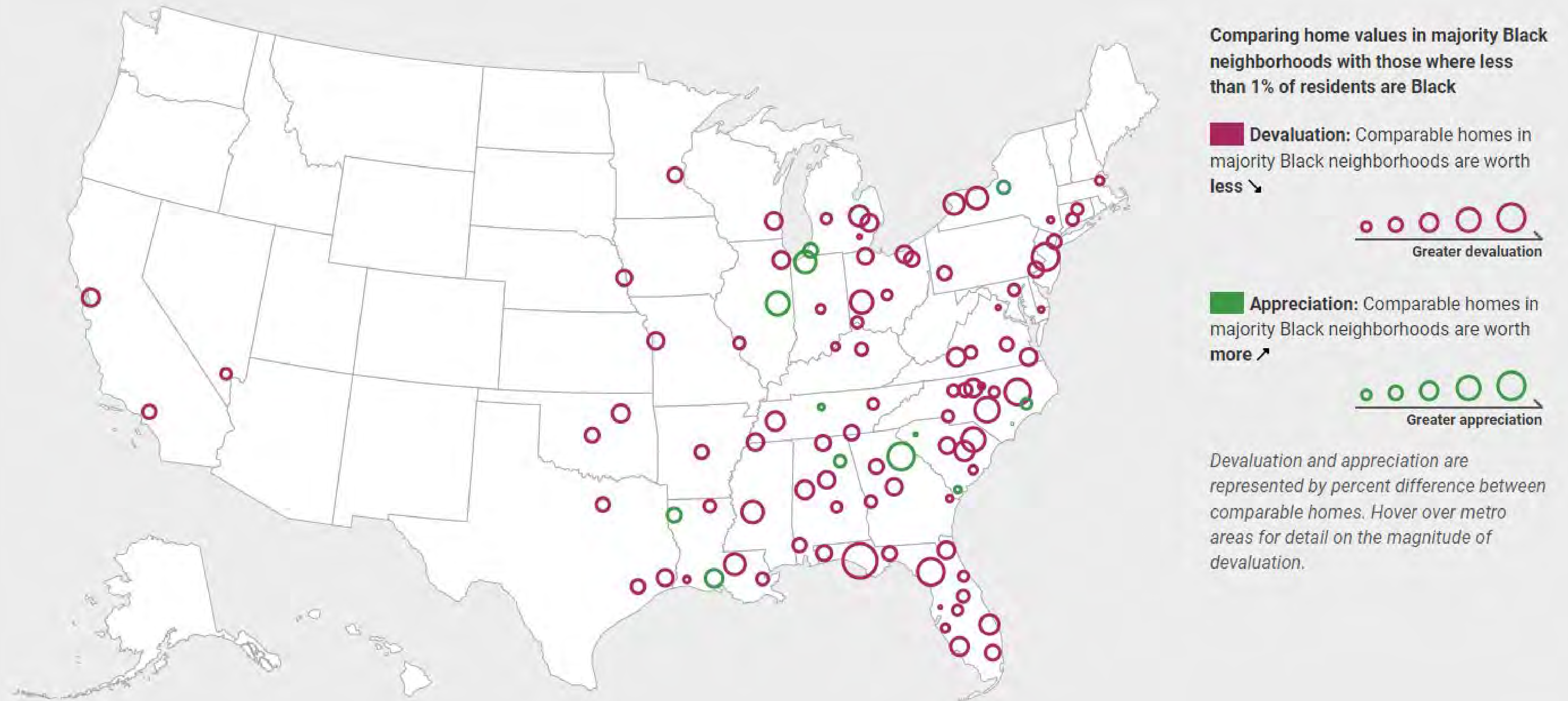

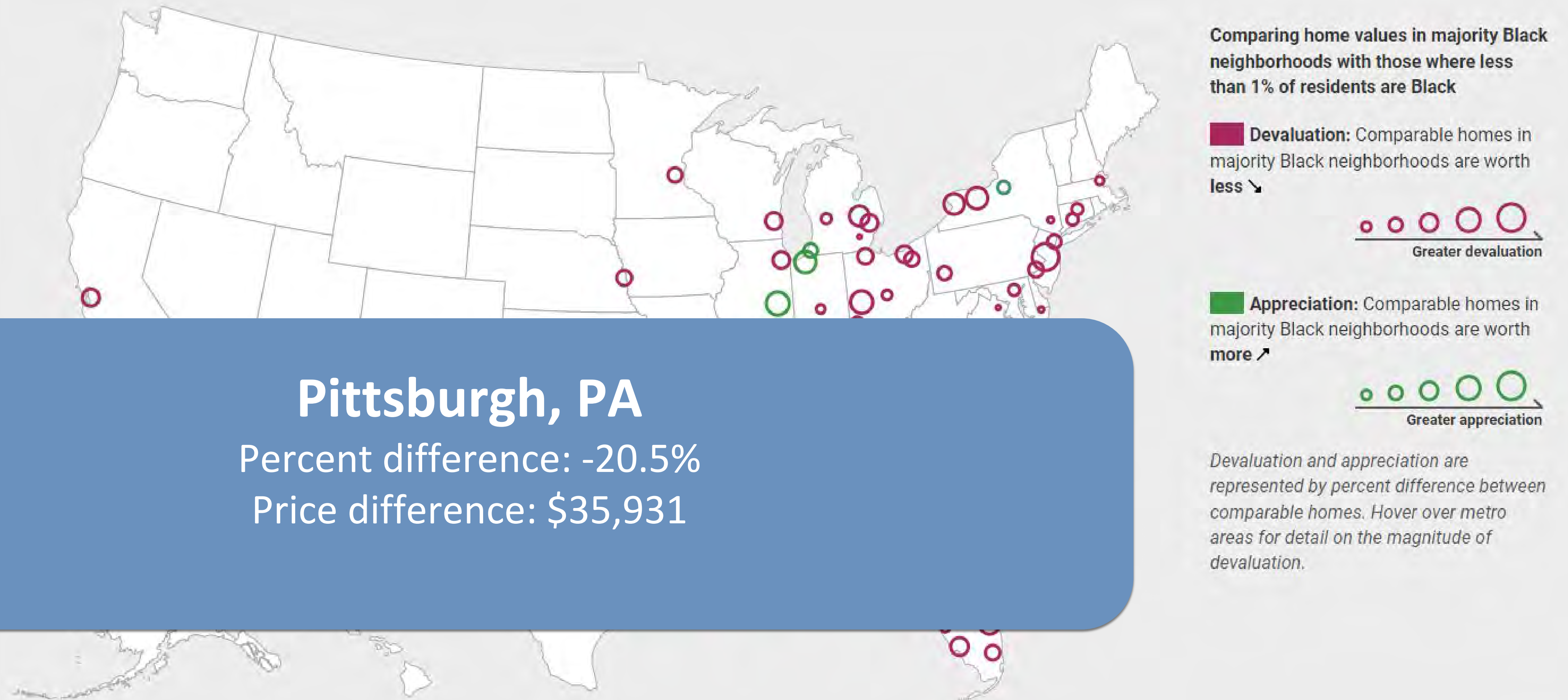

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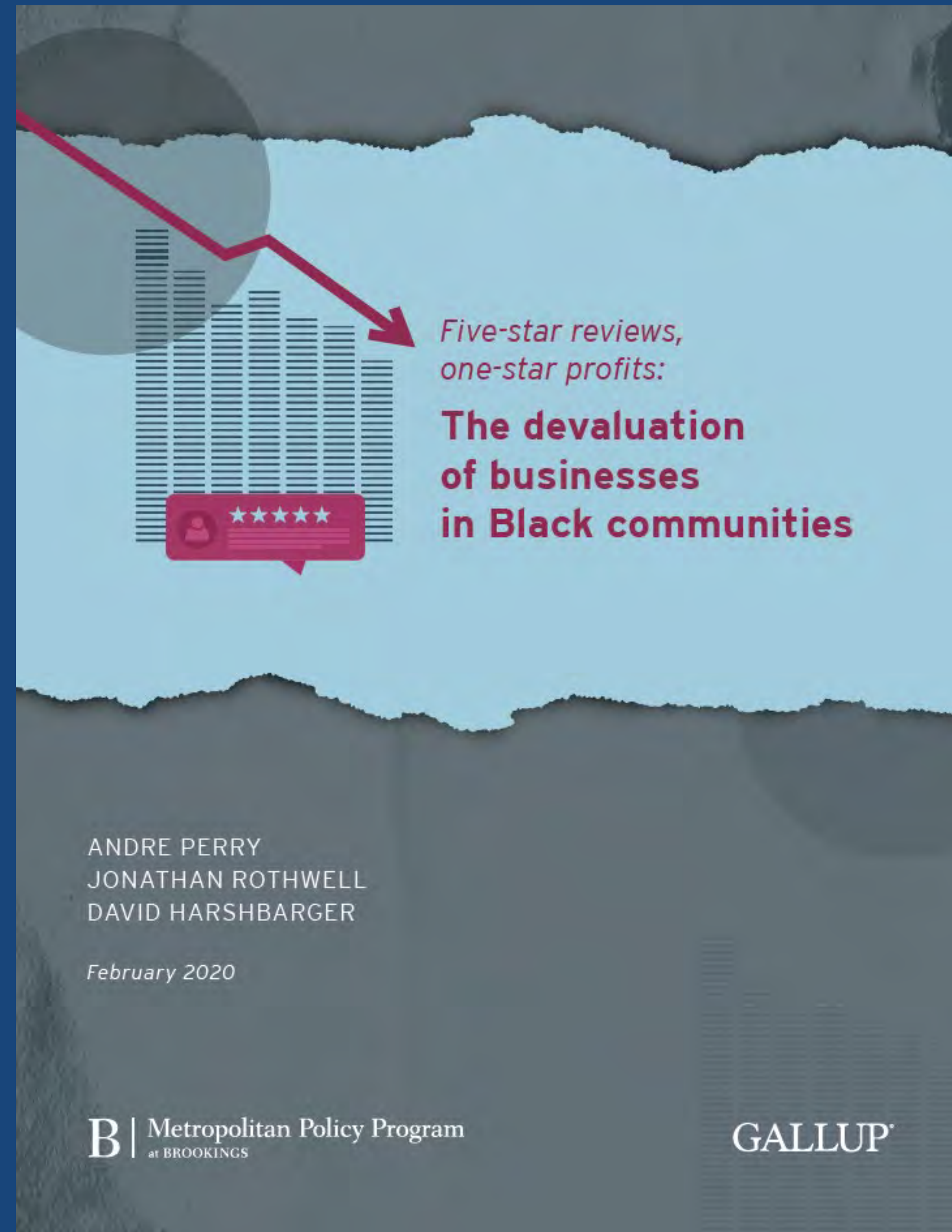

The State of Black Businesses

- Black people comprise **14.2%** of the U.S. population, but Black businesses are only **2.4%** of the nation's **5.7 million employer businesses**

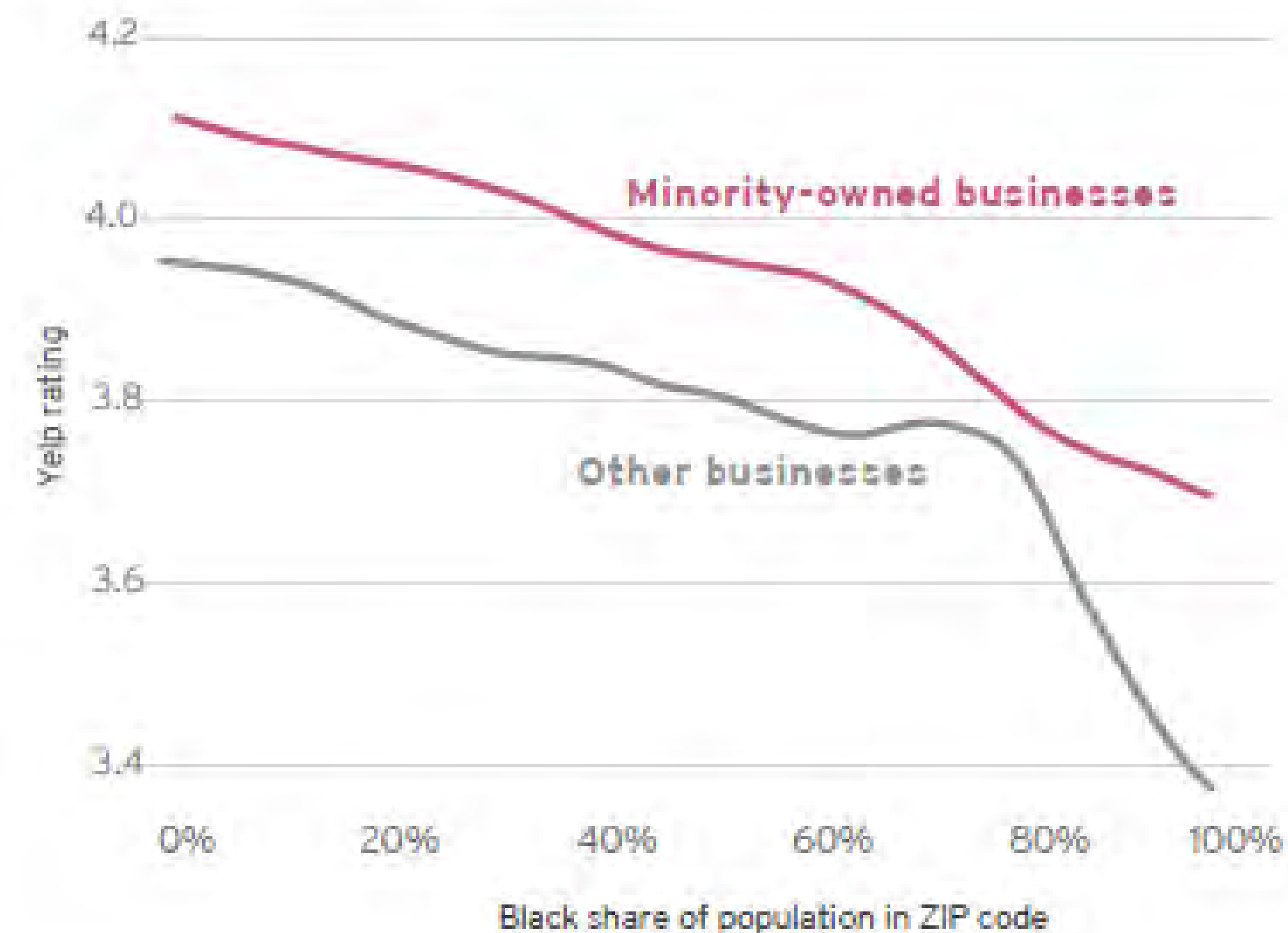

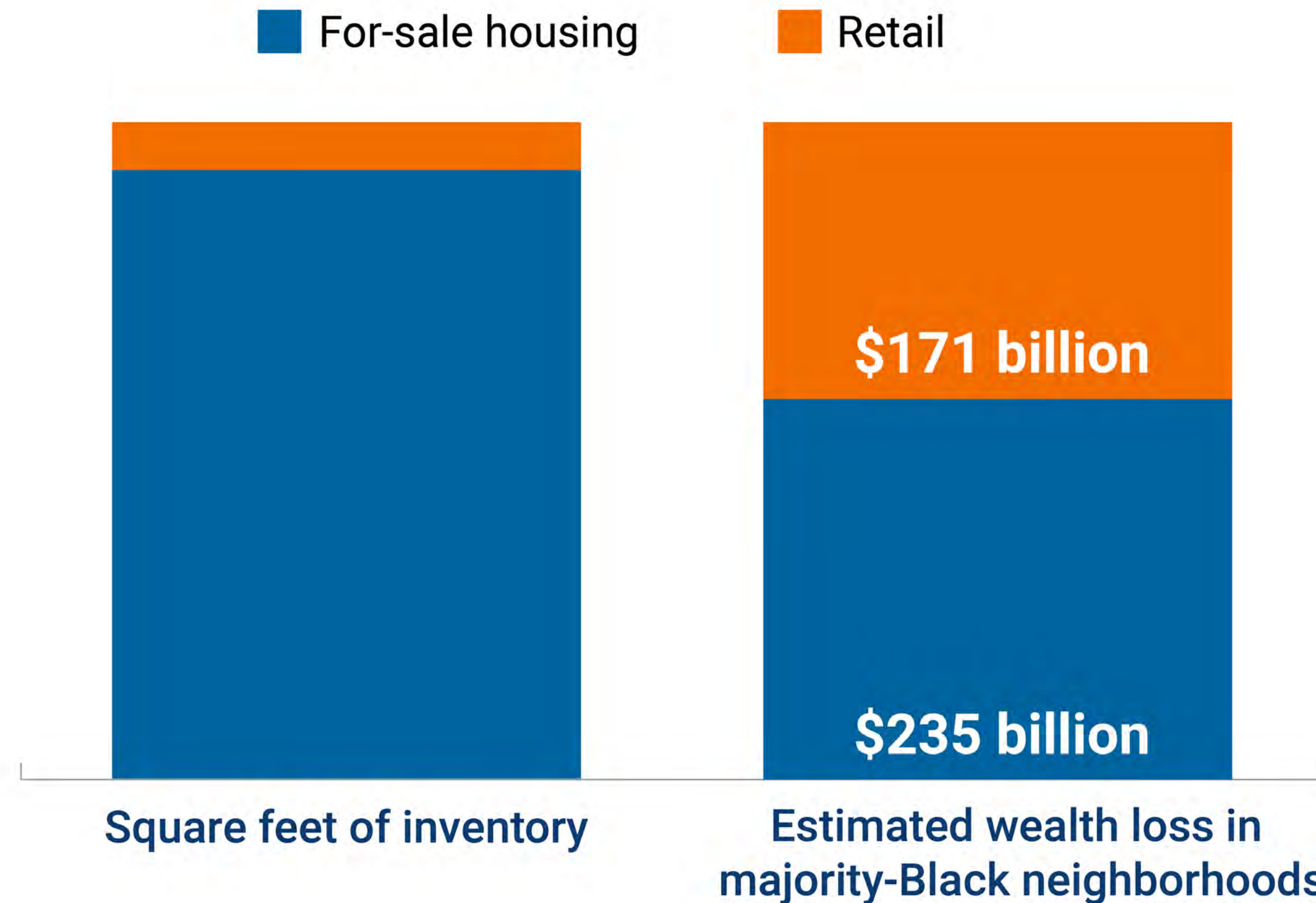

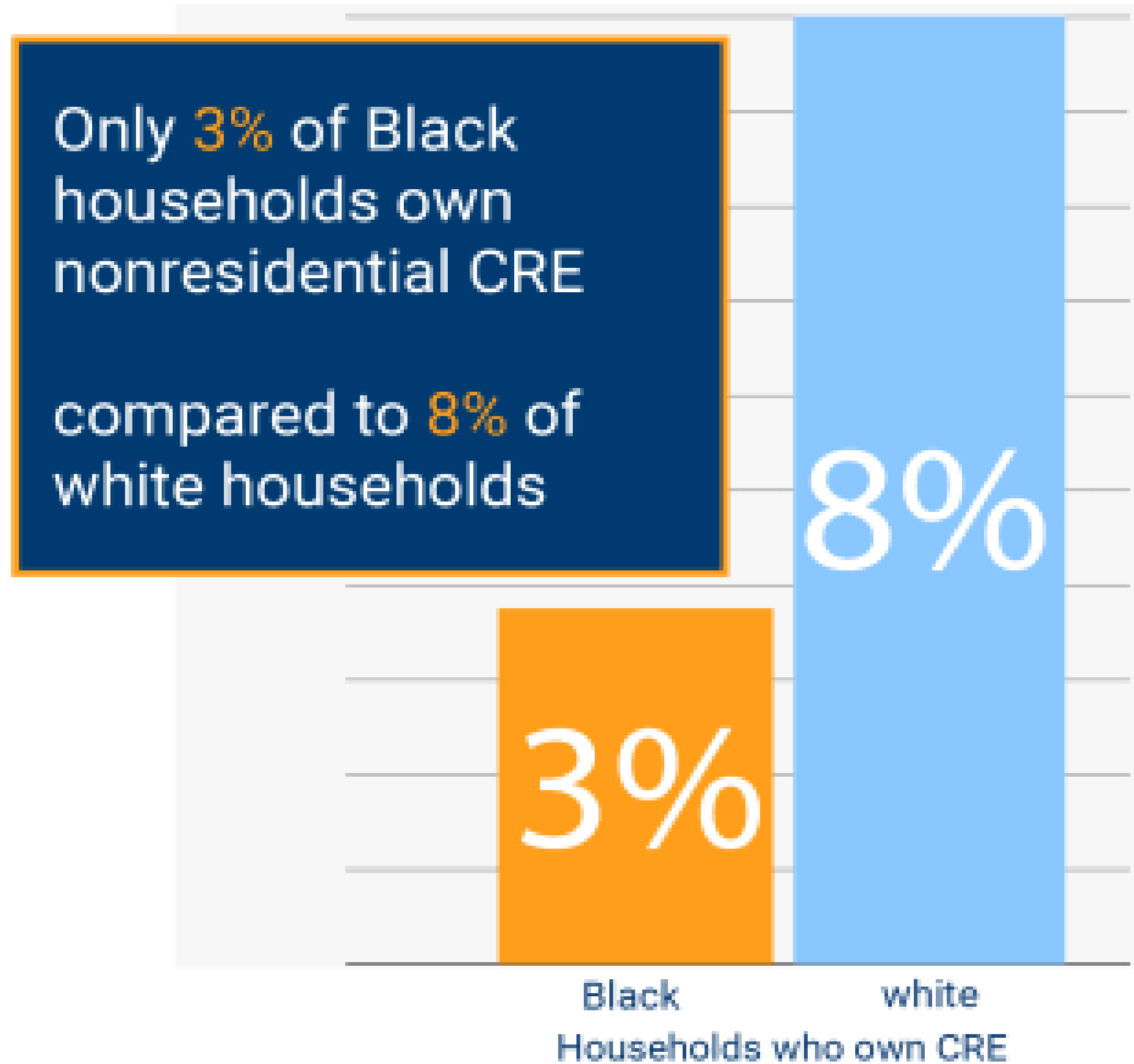

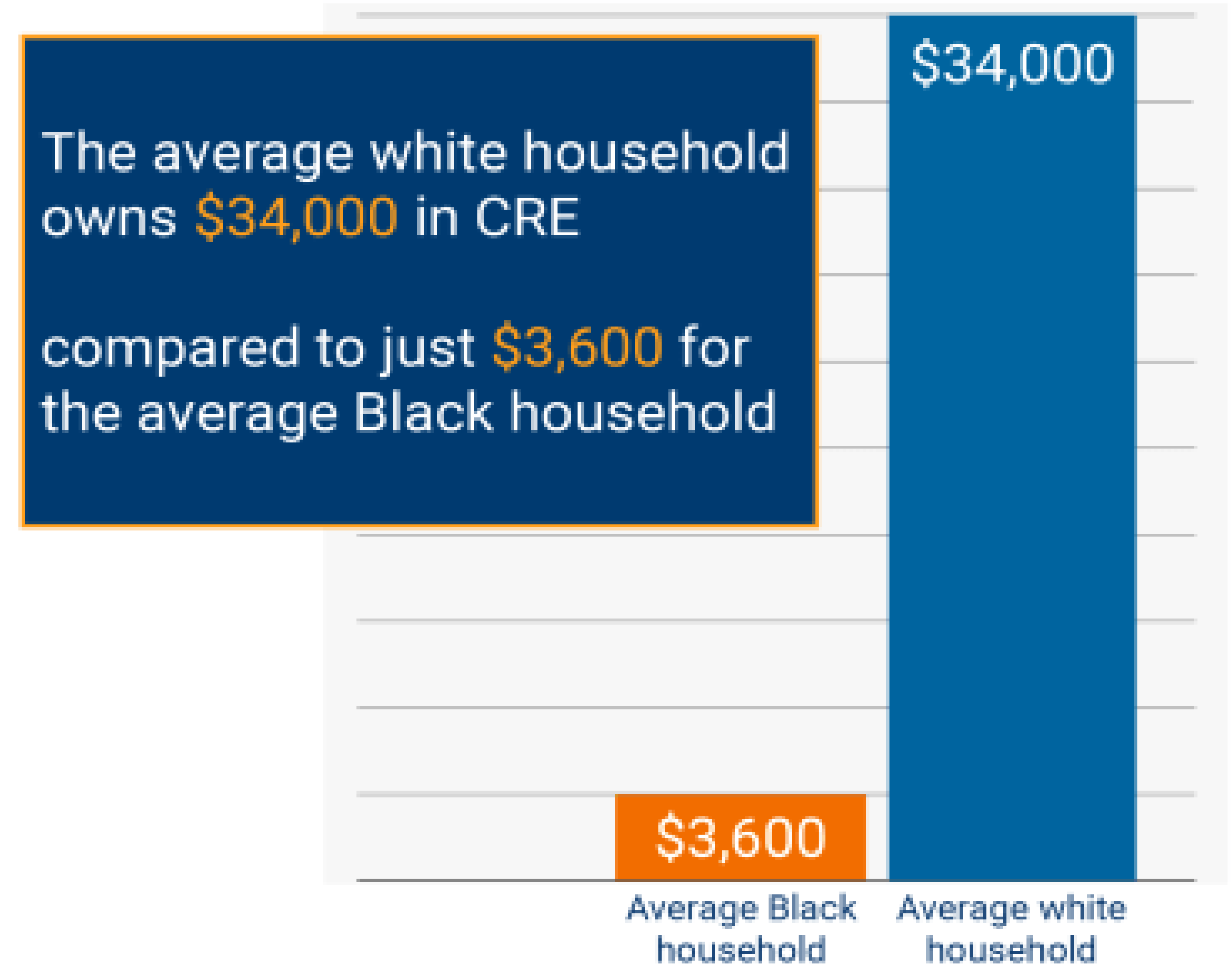

The Black Progress Index:

A focus on life expectancy and well-being

Life expectancy summarizes the many biological and non-biological influences on our lives. Our main goal is to identify the social factors that predict life expectancy because they are a cumulative measure of health and well-being.

The Black Progress Index

- The Black Progress Index is an interactive dashboard and report that examine the social factors that influence well being.
- Through a partnership between the NAACP and the Brookings Institution, the Index and related content will evolve, as research progresses.
- The overarching mission is to identify and strengthen the drivers of prosperity in Black communities.
- Where, geographically speaking, should we look for solutions?

Methodology

Three Stages of Analysis

- First, our discovery stage involved downloading and processing hundreds of variables from a variety of data sources, including the U.S. Census Bureau, DOJ Hate Crimes data, Internal Revenue Service, the Federal Reserve, Facebook, Redfin, the U.S. Congress Joint Economic Committee's Social Capital Project, Fatal Encounters (police shootings), etc.
- Stage two, we ran these variables through a common machine-learning algorithm (Lasso) to select variables and rank variable importance, using life expectancy at birth and age-adjusted mortality as the target outcomes.
- In stage three, we categorized the variables Lasso selected into distinct constructs. Then, we re-ran models with a smaller range of possible variables to reflect the best candidates within each family of constructs.

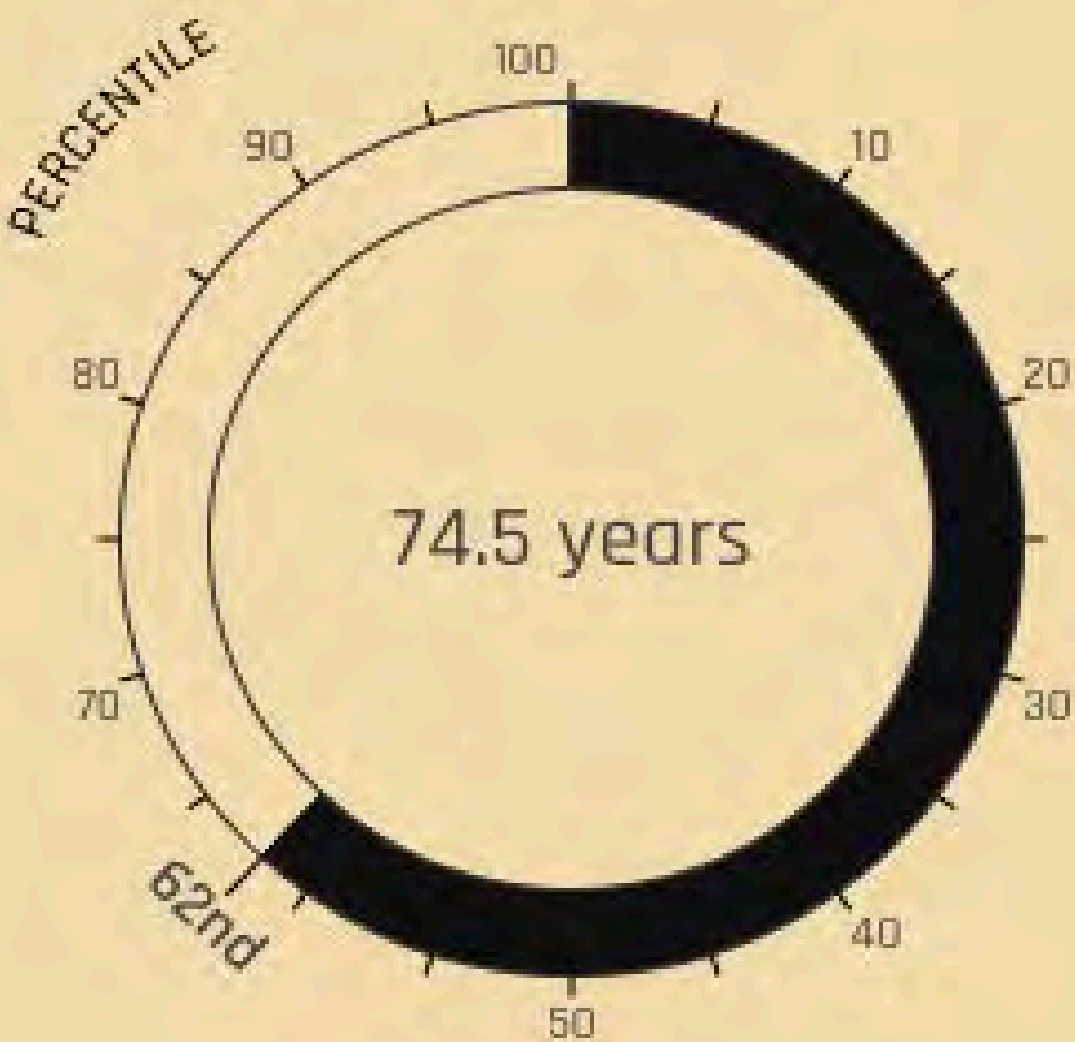

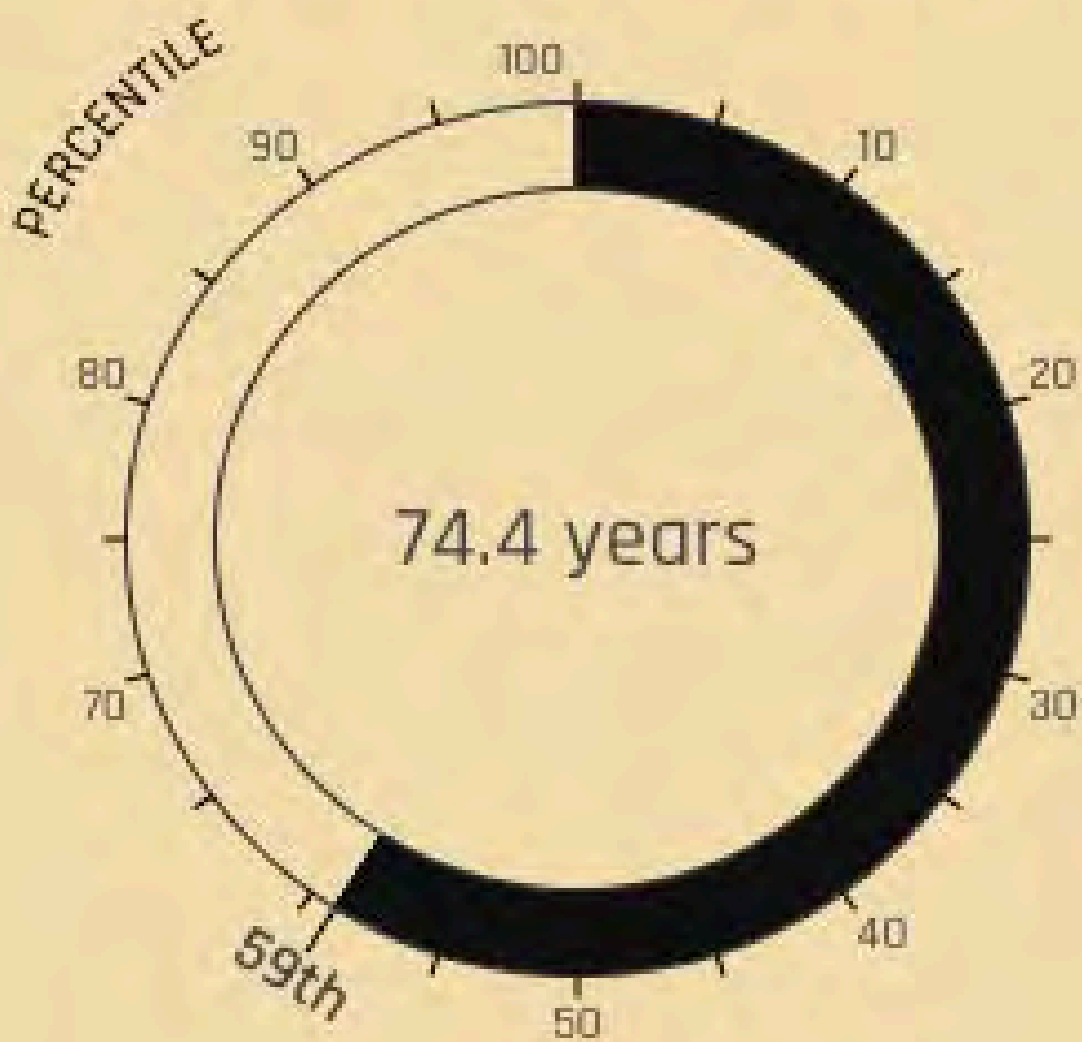

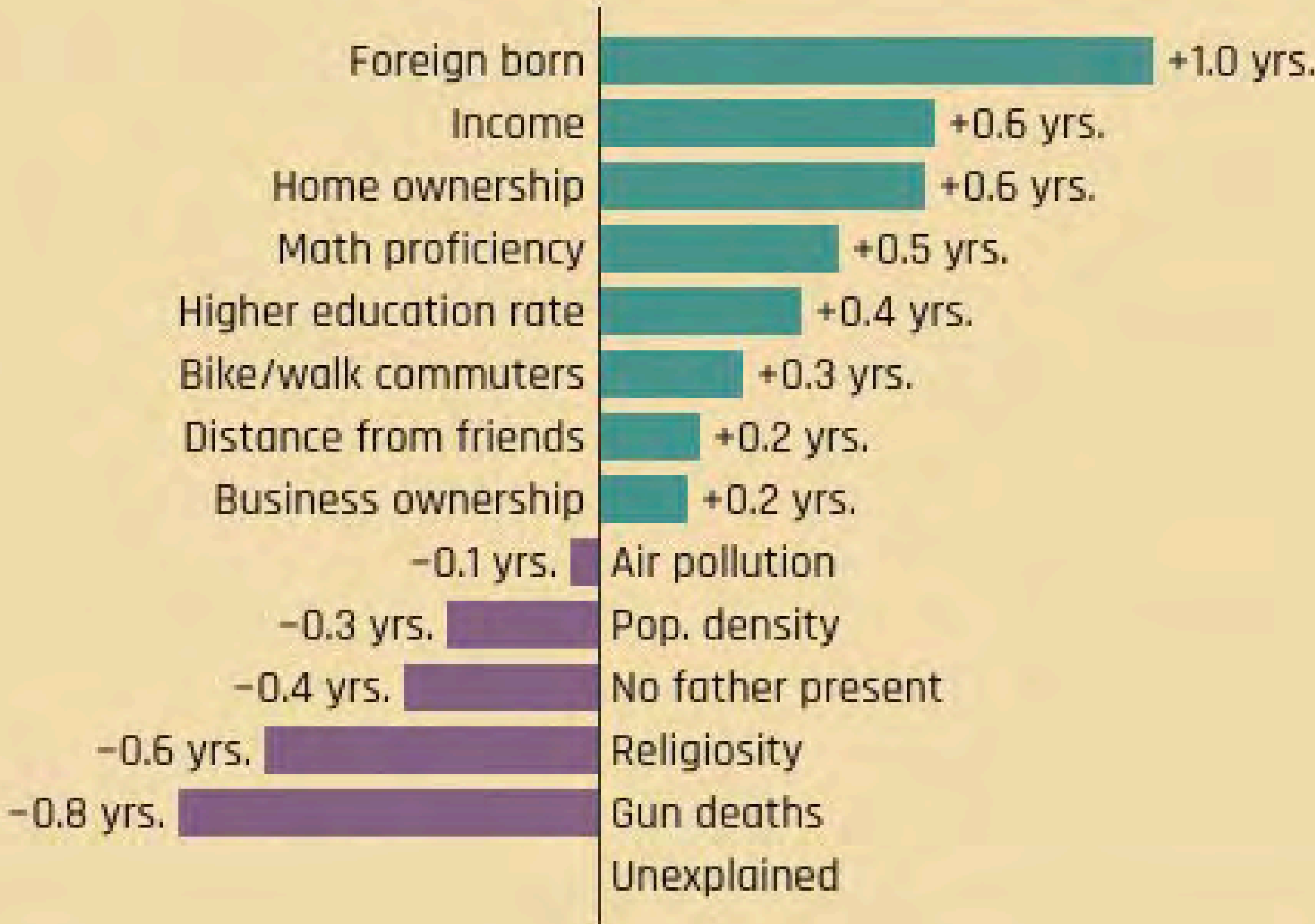
PREDICTED BLACK LIFE EXPECTANCY BY THE BLACK PROGRESS INDEX

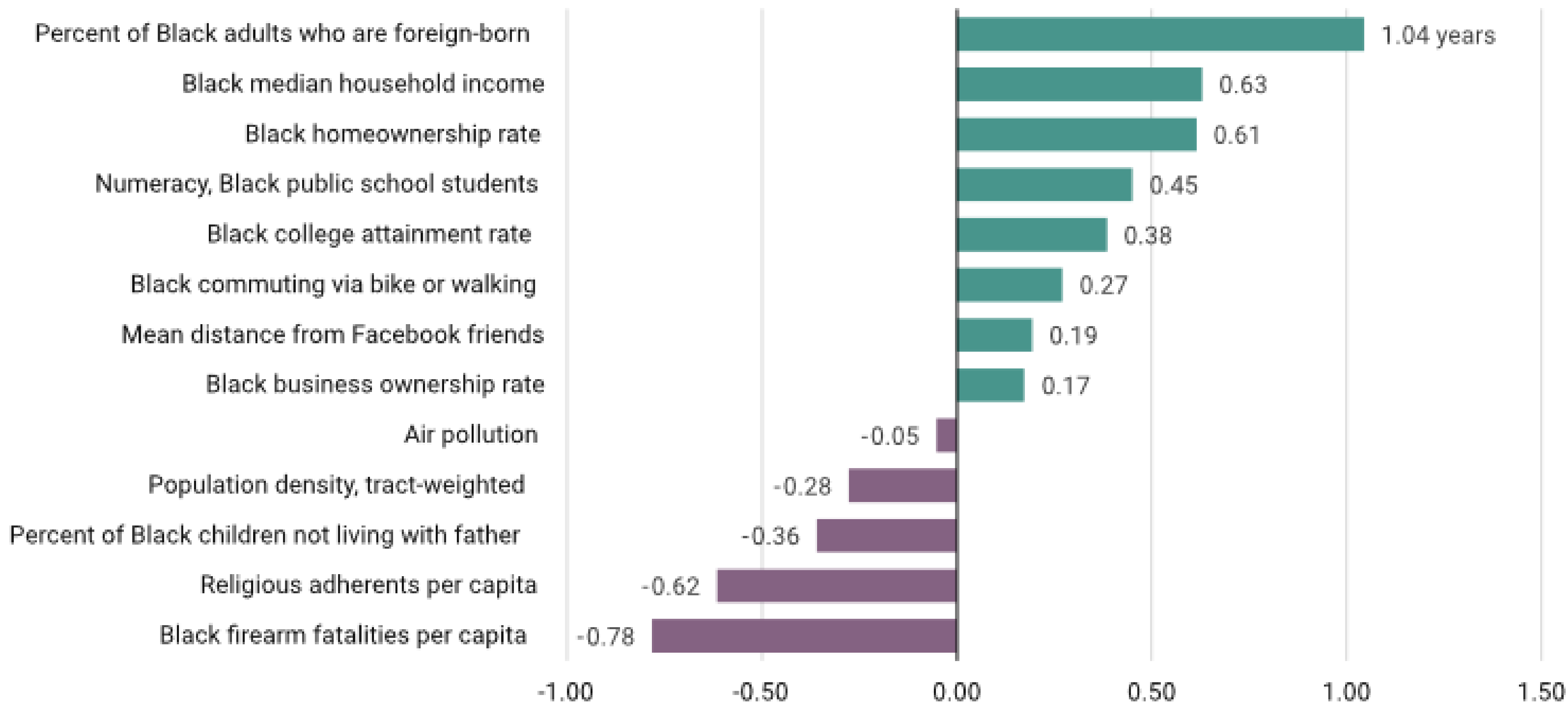

Contribution of social determinants of health to Black Progress Index



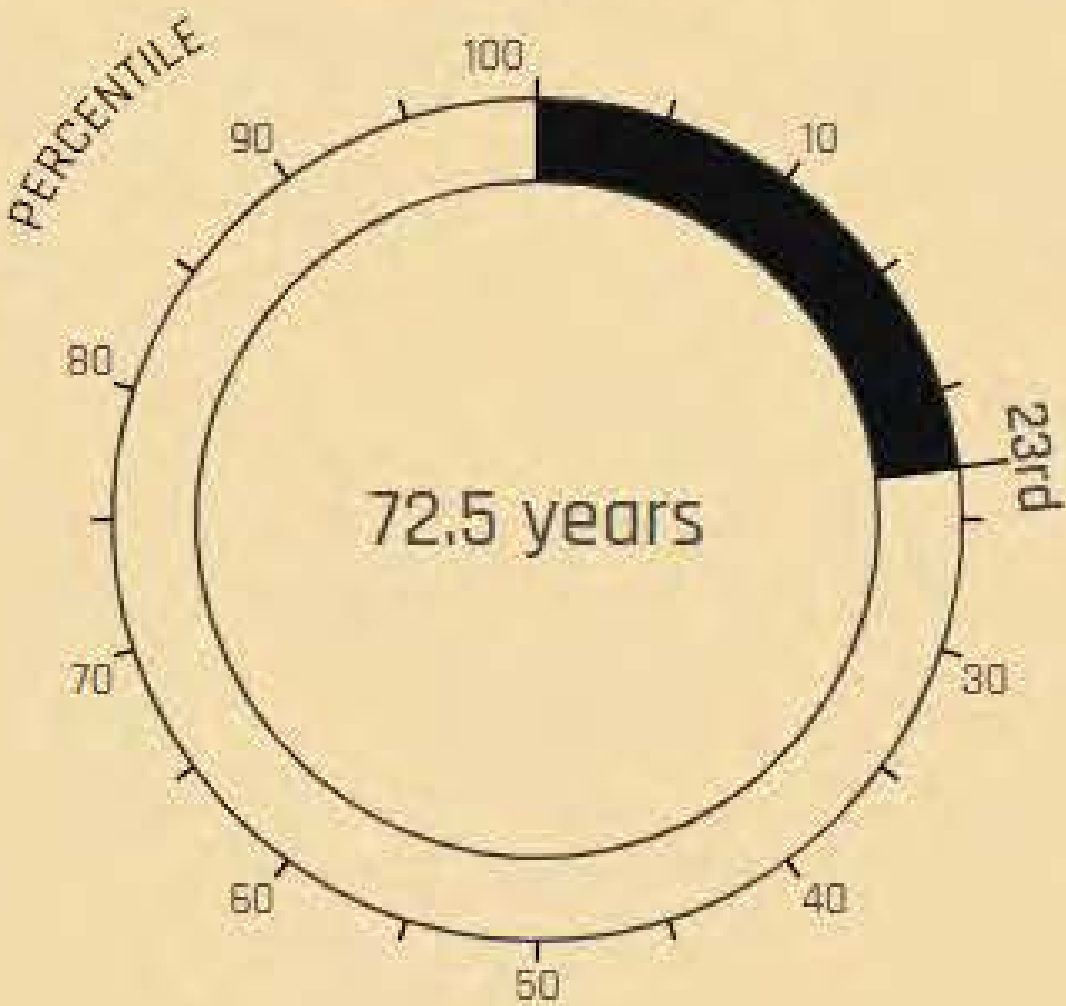

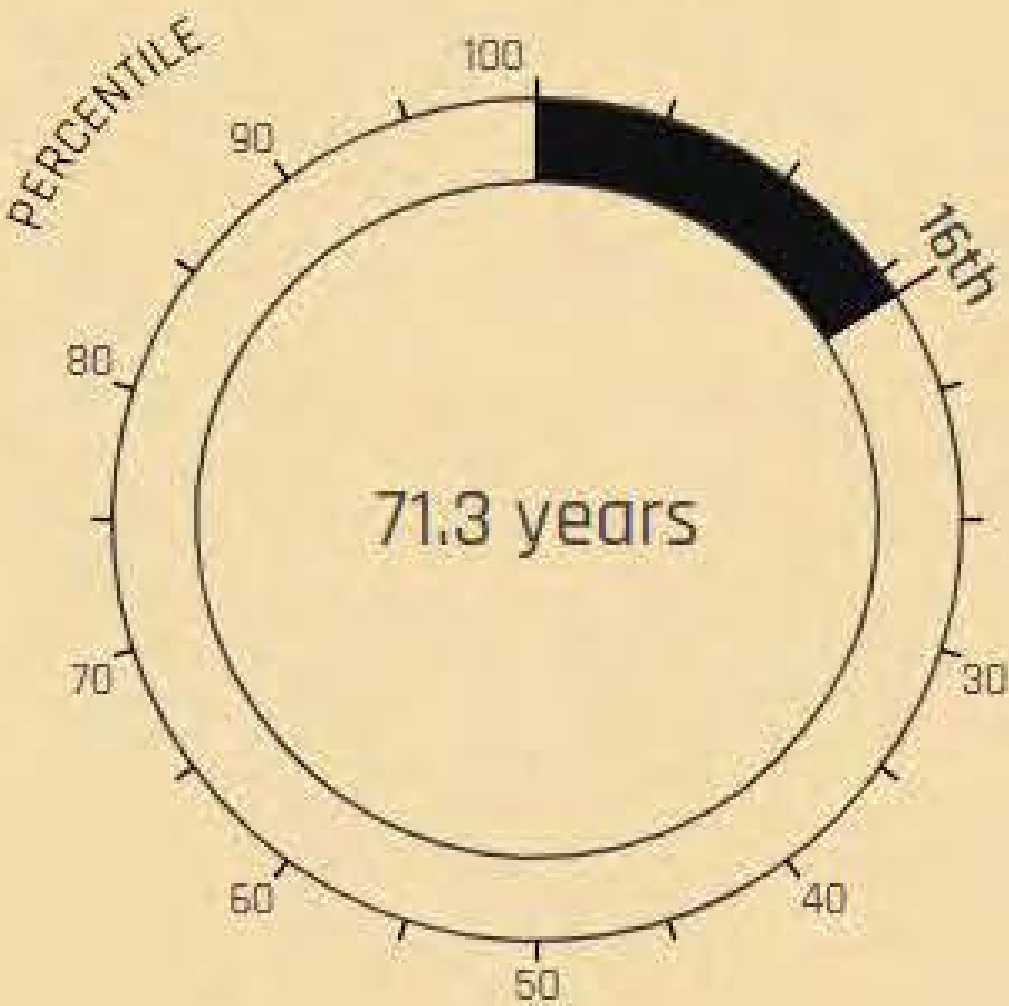

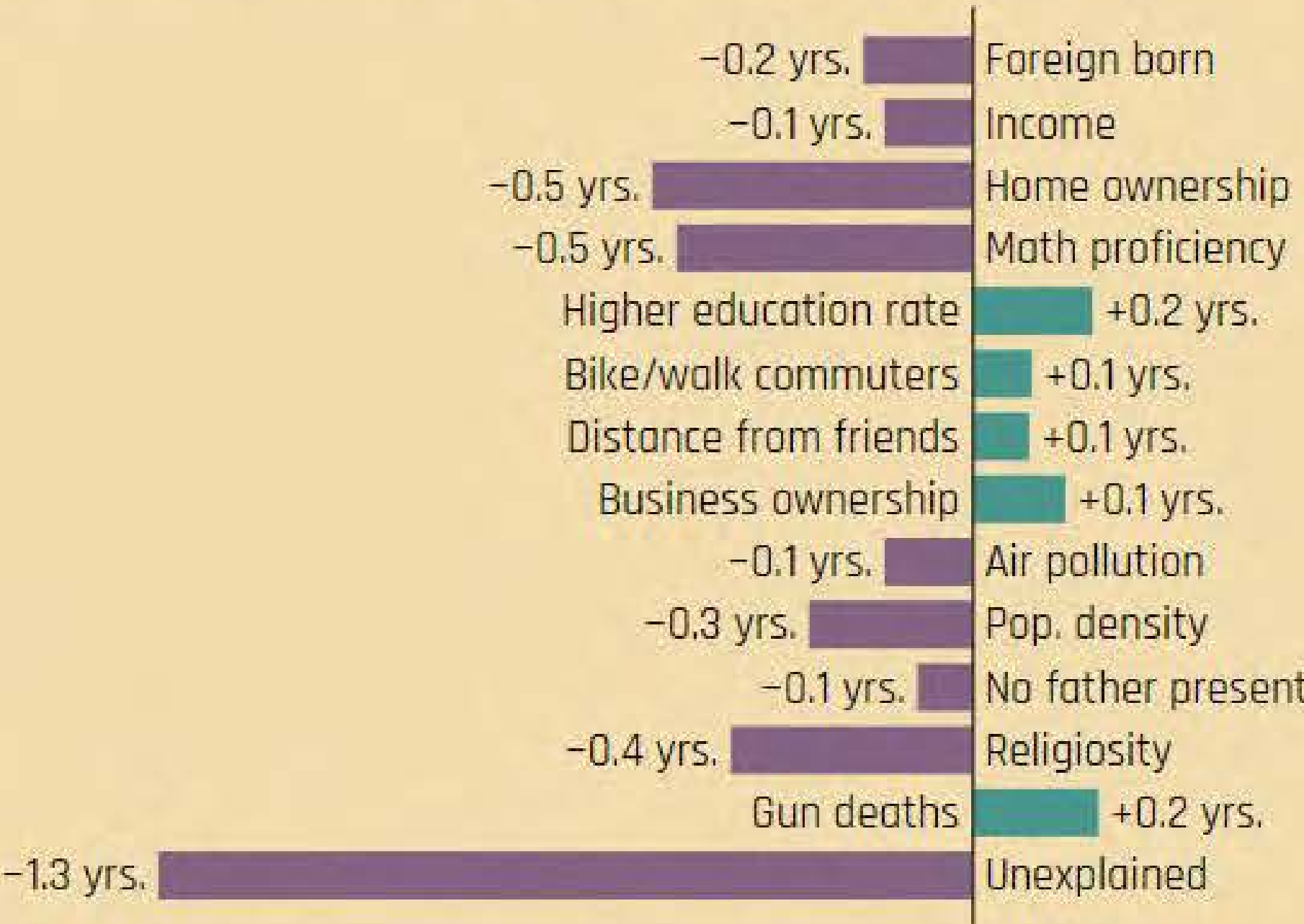

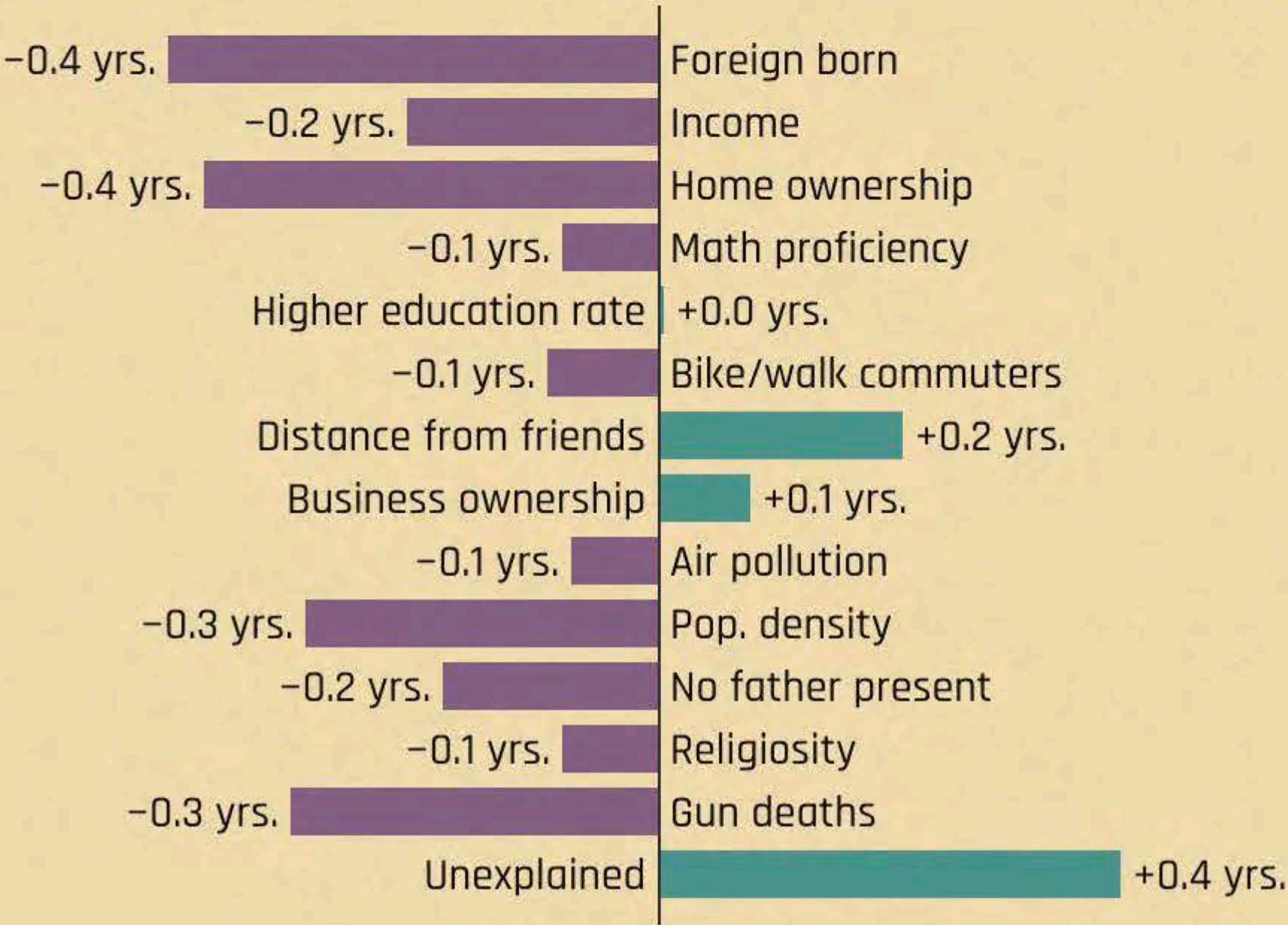

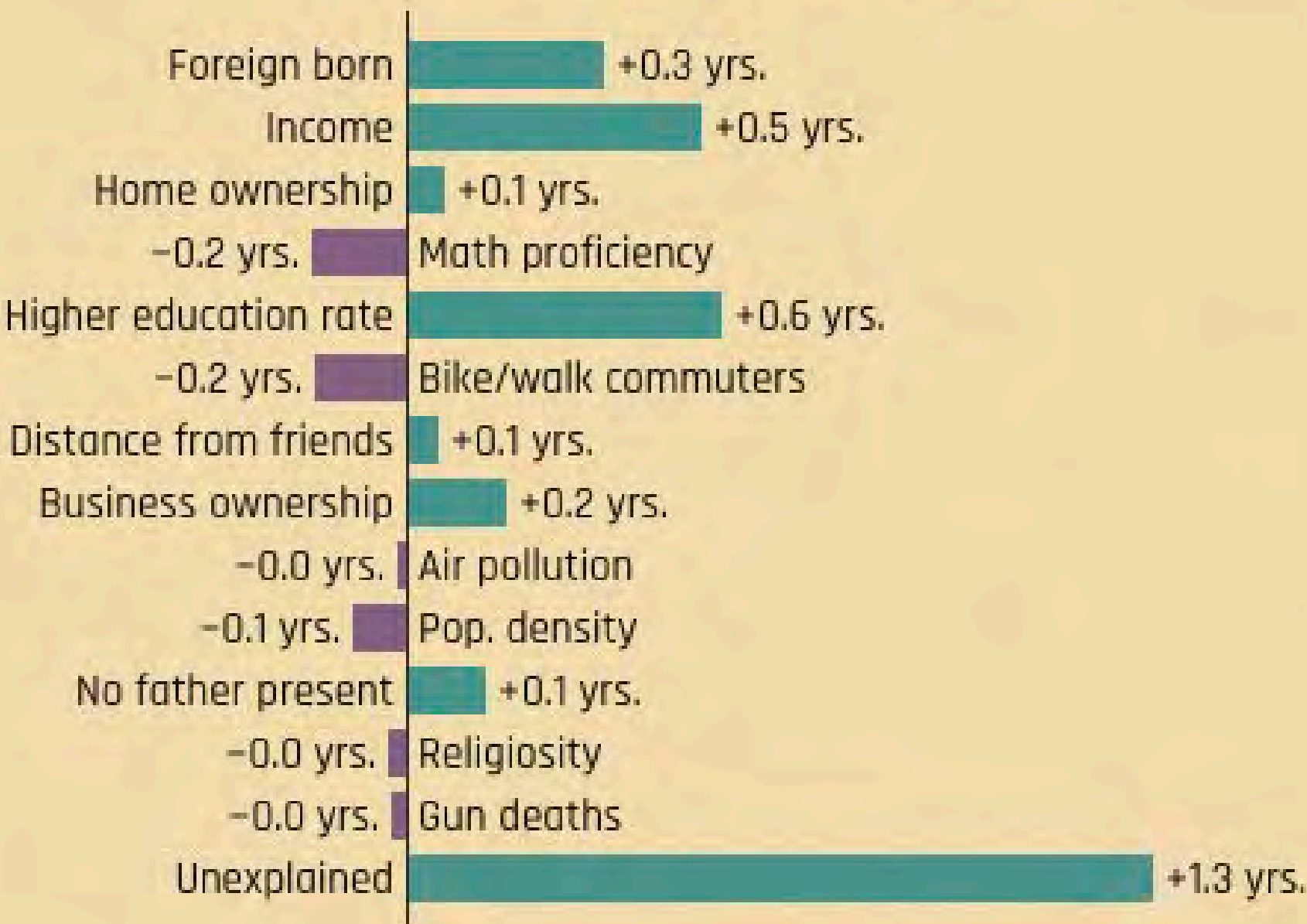

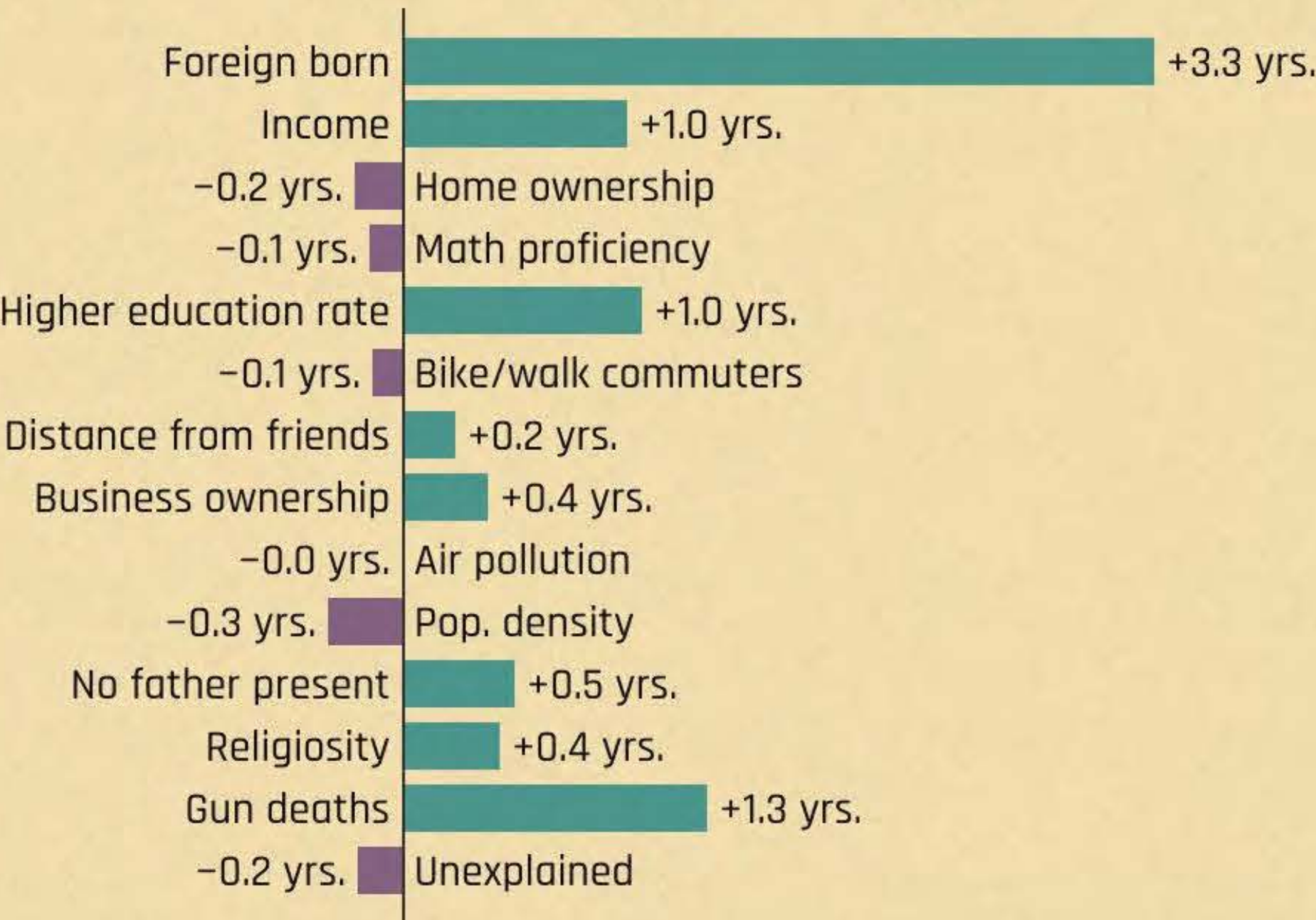

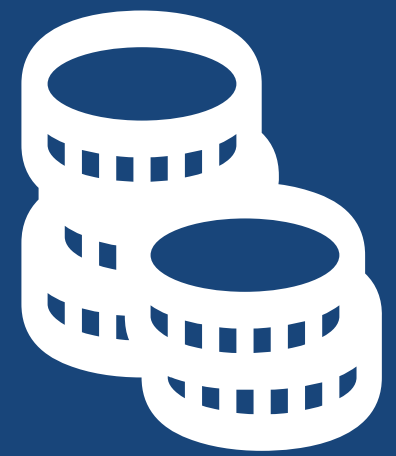

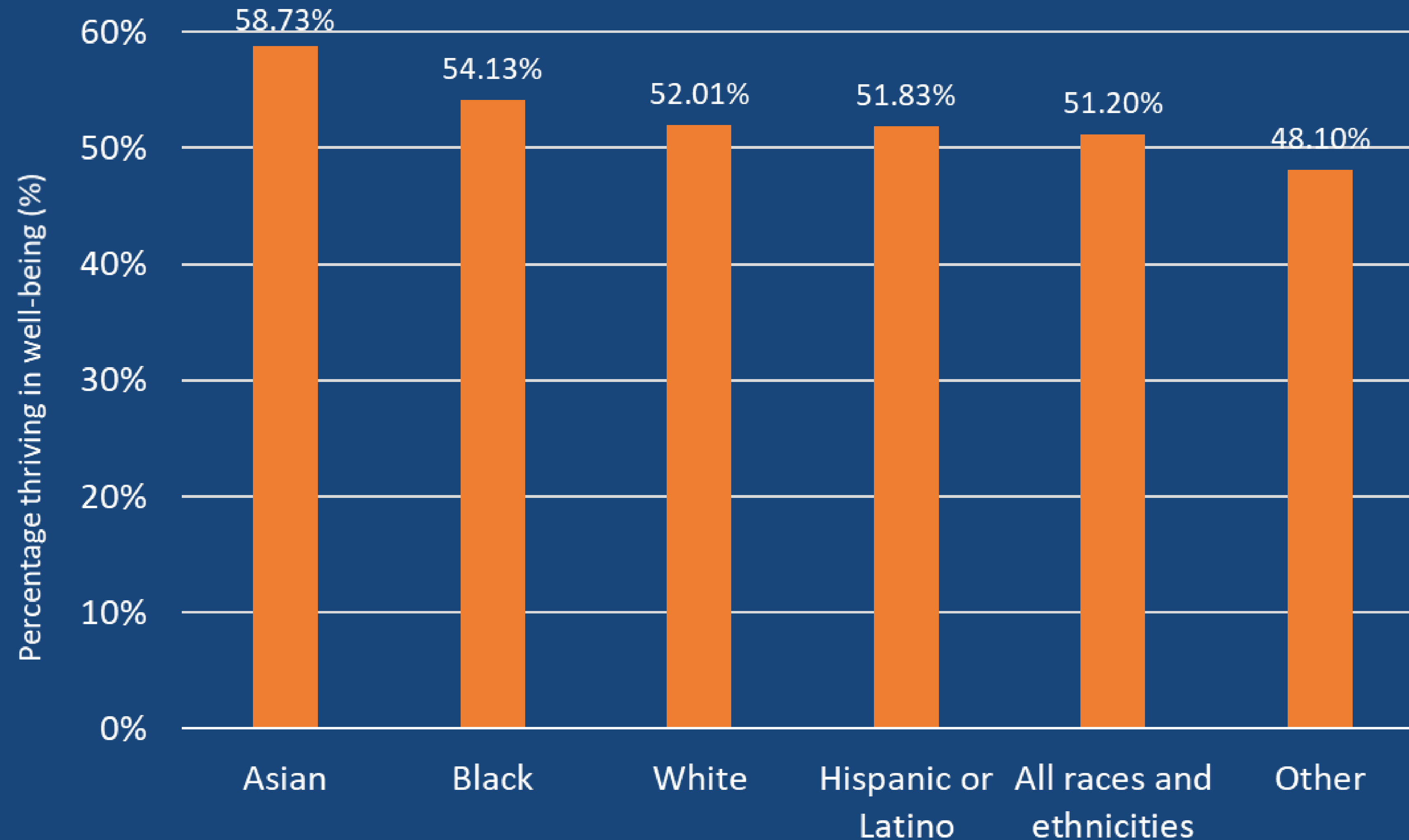

Equity is Stimulus

Black businesses are underrepresented

Black people comprise **14.2%** of the U.S. population, but Black businesses are only **2.4%** of the nation's **5.7 million employer businesses**

If Black businesses were the equivalent of the Black population, there would be more than **670,000 more Black businesses.**

In Pittsburgh, Black businesses are underrepresented

Black people comprise approximately **9.8%** of the Pittsburgh metro area's population, but Black businesses are only **1%** of the metro's over **42,000 employer firms**.

There are **428** Black businesses, compared to **41,968** non-Black businesses.

If Black businesses were the equivalent of the Black population, there would be **3,726 more Black businesses**.

In Pittsburgh, Black businesses are underrepresented

Black businesses create an average of **13 jobs per firm**, compared to **25 for non-Black businesses**.

If the average employees per Black business increased to 25, **approximately 5,000 jobs would be created**.

If Black businesses were the equivalent of the Black population AND increased their employment to the level of non-Black businesses they would create over **93,000 jobs**.

How to counter devaluation

Invest in **PEOPLE**

- Direct capital toward Black, Indigenous, Brown and Asian-owned firms (DBEs) and homeowners (Cut the Check)
- Remove unnecessary bureaucratic barriers to entry for entrepreneurship and homeownership

Invest in **PLACES**

- Make targeted infrastructure investments in Black neighborhoods
- Partner with businesses and developers to incentivize renovation and provide commercial spaces

Divest from **RACISM**

- Remove policies that extract wealth from Black communities
- Just as we score policies' budget impact, we should score for racial equity as well
- Install anti-racist policies that encourage inclusion
